

DEVELOPING THE NEXT GENERATION OF PUBLIC HEALTH LEADERS

For sustainable and inclusive development, the need for innovative public health leaders has never been greater in Bangladesh. The explicit mission of the BRAC James P. Grant School of Public Health is to develop innovative public health leaders and provide solutions through cutting-edge, experiential Education, Training, Research and Advocacy.

Started in 2004, over 500 graduates from 30 countries including Bangladesh have completed the flagship Masters of Public Health (MPH) programme and are contributing both nationally and globally. Graduates have moved on to set up the midwifery programs, joined government ministries, managed humanitarian and epidemic crisis at home and abroad (e.g., Rohingya camps in Bangladesh and Ebola in Liberia), joined national and international programs and institutions including research institutions, teaching at renowned Universities, and contributing to informing and influencing health policies.

Among our graduates, 10 have completed, and 32 are currently in the process of completing, PhDs at universities like Basel, Columbia, Emory, Freie, Harvard, Heidelberg, Johns Hopkins, La Trobe, London School of Hygiene & Tropical Medicine, Monash, Stockholm, Sussex, Sydney, and Toronto.

The School's funding has been largely donor-driven, thereby restricting its full capacity to address the most urgent community health needs within Bangladesh. To realize its vision to be the leading regional PH Institute to address the priority health challenges affecting Bangladesh and South Asia's most disadvantaged communities, BRAC JPGSPH requires support from Bangladesh's own philanthropists and private sector. Through strategic local funding partnerships, BRAC JPGSPH can ensure its long-term impact on the most vulnerable communities in Bangladesh and other developing countries.

The Scholarship recipients will participate in a comprehensive, people-centered health learning praxis where real world health problems demand real world innovative solutions. Through immersive, experiential learning coupled with critical public health skills to solve problems, the scholars will be constantly challenged to bring out the best in them whether in communities, or clinics in the public and private sectors, or outreach facilities of the NGOs and faith-based organizations, or hospitals.



The School invites philanthropists to support its Scholarships for high potential, young women health professionals. We are happy to announce that a local philanthropist has already established the School's first such scholarship fund in memory of his mother and mother-in-law's names through a one-time donation of Taka 2.5 crores. Proceeds from the fund will be used to, provide MPH tuition to meritorious and socio-economically disadvantaged women students to pursue their Public Health careers.
