Brief Description: BRAC JPGSPH organised this three-day in-person workshop on Fundamentals of Qualitative Research, titled- 'Thinking Qualitatively', from 29-31 March 2022. The workshop was facilitated by Professor Shahaduz Zaman, Medical Anthropology and Global Health Departmental Lead, Culture, Society and Health Theme and Co-Director, Social Sciences for Severely Stigmatized Skin Diseases (5S) Foundation, Global Health and Infection Department, Brighton and Sussex Medical School, University of Sussex, UK. The three-day workshop provided a deeper understanding of qualitative research methods to the



participants, which included development practitioners and aspiring researchers working in public sector institutes, NGOs, academia, research institutions, and other civil society organizations and are involved in qualitative/mixed method research studies.

- TRAINING OF TRAINERS ON SEXUALITY, SEXUAL AND REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH AND RIGHTS FOR MASTER TRAINERS OF TERE DES HOMMES (TDH) THE NETHERLANDS, BANGLADESH

Brief description: The training of trainers (ToT) was a part of a series of capacity building activities for the master trainers of TDH NL, Bangladesh. The objective of the training was to improve their capacity and facilitation skill to provide training on the issues of Sexuality, Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights to the field level employees of DGHS and DGFP of the government of Bangladesh and the staff of Pollisree, a local NGO, working in Dinajpur district. Some key issues covered in the training are conceptual clarity of SRHR, with a focus on the consent and choice regarding bodily rights of early married girls (EMGs) of Dinajpur district; identifying the root causes of not exercising SRHR or EMGs and its impact on their lives, fatherhood, etc. The training methods involved participatory learning processes like case story analysis, role play, situation analysis etc. and on various examples of SRHR issues collected during a training needs assessment conducted in Dinajpur. Sudipta MuKhopadhyay, from India, facilitated the training with the support of a facilitation team from RHSTEP, Bangladesh and BRAC-JPGSPH.

- COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT STAKEHOLDER DIALOGUES

Community engagement in the form of stakeholder dialogue (SD) meetings is a participatory approach in line with the Sonar-Global Action Framework, in which community engagement (CE) SD meetings foster dialogue and ownership by engaging stakeholders to share their knowledge and collaborate with one another. As part of SoNAR Global community engagement activities in Bangladesh, the study team conducted four 'Community Engagement Stakeholder Dialogues' in four selected districts including Cumilla, Chittagong, Sylhet and Narayanganj in February 2022. Objective of the workshop was to stimulate dialogue, gather insights and provide a platform for exchange of views among mixed group stakeholders for their perception and recommendations on COVID-19 community engagement approaches. The dialogue provided scope to identify potential obstacles and solutions to address factors contributing to community engagement activities in such an epidemic. A total 100 participants of various socio-economic and professional background (e.g., health care providers (public, private, formal informal), NGO represents, community leaders, local influential people, students, volunteers, transgender, sex workers, religious leaders, domestic workers, housewife, teachers, retired elderly person, small business owner, daily wage earners) joined the discussion. TRAINING COURSE ON IMPLEMENTATION RESEARCH

Number of participants: Twenty (20) [6 participants from BRAC JPGSPH, 7 participants from ARK Foundation Bangladesh, 7 participants from HERD International, Nepal] **Date:** 5th-7th April 2022

Brief description: The course will be organized as part of CHORUS project's capacity strengthening activities led by Dr. Zahidul Quayyum, Professor and Director Research, BRAC JPGSPH. This will be a 3-day training course offered to the CHORUS researchers of three partner organizations in the South Asian region (BRAC JPGSPH and ARK Foundation from Bangladesh, HERD International from Nepal). The course will be coordinated by Dr. Malabika Sarker, Professor & Associate Dean, Director, Center of Excellence for Science of Implementation & Scale Up, BRAC JPGSPH. The ultimate goal of this course will be to imbed implementation research as part of the system and the implementation process. Implementation research (IR) helps design strategies or solutions to overcome bottlenecks that prevent proven and innovative public health interventions to reach the people who need them and ensure that these interventions are used in a manner that results in the outcome

for which they were intended. At the end of this course, participants will be able to understand the basic concept on cycle of implementation; recognize the importance of context in IR; critically appraise role of stakeholders; familiarize themselves with IR Framework; formulate of IR research Question and select appropriate study design; recognize the connection between IR and Health system; understand the role of ethics in IR and appreciate the importance of knowledge translation.

- TRAINING COURSE ON QUASI-EXPERIMENTAL METHODS FOR POLICY EVALUATION

Date: 25th-27th April, 2022

Brief description: The course will be organized as part of CHORUS project's capacity strengthening activities led by Dr. Zahidul Quayyum, Professor and Director Research, BRAC JPGSPH. This will be a 3-day training course offered to the CHORUS researchers of different partner organizations (BRAC JPGSPH and ARK Foundation from Bangladesh, HERD International from Nepal, University of Nigeria, and the University of Ghana). The course will be coordinated by Dr. Daniel Howdon, Health Economist, LIHS UCU Department Representative. This course will seek to explore appropriate methods for the guasi-experimental analysis of observational data. Taking a starting point of an ideal type of experiment, the course will proceed through discussion of randomized controlled trials (RCTs) and ways in which this gold standard can be best proxied in cases where RCTs are either undesirable or infeasible. Students will be introduced to a discussion of various techniques for the analysis of data in such cases, encompassing matching methods, regression discontinuity design, difference-in-difference analysis, and interrupted time series analysis. By the end of the course, students will be able to identify the most appropriate methods given the data and problem at hand and implement these methods using STATA. - ARISE TRAINING ON PARTICIPATORY ACTION RESEARCH METHODS

Facilitators: Bachera Aktar, Saifa Raz, Muhammad Riaz Hossain, Atiya Rahman **Participants**: Seven members from ARISE Bangladesh team and three field research assistants from three study sites of the project in Dhaka, Kallyanpur, Shyampur and Dholpur.

Brief Description: The training aimed to familiarize the participants with four tools under 'Participatory Action Research' method, service mapping, stakeholder mapping, social mapping and transect walk, and research ethics and safeguarding to prepare the team for qualitative data collection. The training program includes sessions on concepts of different study tools, role-play sessions, field tests at Korail slum and debriefing sessions on learnings from the field. - THE WHO PACKAGE OF ESSENTIAL NONCOMMUNICABLE DISEASES (PEN) TRAINING CONDUCTED BY THE CENTRE FOR NON-COMMUNICABLE DISEASES AND NUTRITION (CNCDN) IN COX'S BAZAR



Number of participants: 151 | Date: 16 May 2022 - 23 June 2022

Brief Description:

The Centre for Non-communicable Diseases and Nutrition team of BRAC JPGSPH has been providing training to both the government and non-government Primary Health Care (PHC) workers on the World Health Organization (WHO) Package of Essential Non-communicable Diseases (PEN) Interventions from 2019 in collaboration with the Non-communicable Diseases Control (NCDC) unit of DGHS and the WHO Bangladesh.

Between 2019 and 2021, the team trained 409 physicians, nurses, medical assistants, and sub-assistant community medical officers (SACMO); and 575 Community Health Volunteer Supervisors and Community Health Volunteers.

This year also CNCDN is also providing the training. This year the training started on 16th May 2022. Till now CNCDN conducted 5 batches of PEN training for 131 participants consisting of doctors, nurses, and sub-assistant community medical officers (SACMO). The training of the 6th and the last batch underwent with 20 participants and ended on 23 June 2022. Each training is residential and has been scheduled for four days. The expert PEN trainers form BRAC JPGSPH (Dr. Rina Rani Paul, Dr. Ali Ahsan Hemel, Dr. Priscilla Khyang, and Dr Uhaisinh Marma) and WHO (Dr Raisul Islam, Dr Md. Watin Islam) have conducted



the training. One of the focuses of the training was an integrated cardio-vascular disease risk-based approach for the management of hypertension and diabetes and encouraging a team-based care approach. To monitor the effect of training on the knowledge and skill of the participants pre-and post-training assessments were conducted. At the end of the training, the participants evaluated the trainers and the quality of the training. Simultaneously we have conducted 6 supportive supervision workshops at upazilla health complexes (Ukhia, Coxbazar Sadar, Chakaria, Teknaf, Pekua, Moheskhali) involving185 participants. Two supportive supervision workshops are remaining (Ramu, Kutubdia).
